CINA ANNUAL MEETING January 28, 2020

Causeway Isles Neighborhood Association's Annual Meeting was held January 28, 2020 at the Garden Center from 6 to 8 pm. Thank you to everyone that came out to eat pizza and socialize from 6 to 6:30 and to attend the business meeting at 6:30.


Two amendments to CINA's bylaws were also voted on and approved:

- 1. Article IV Term Limits Term and limit were amended to extend a Director's term from one to two years and to extend the number of terms that a Director may serve in the same position from three to five consecutive terms. A Director is any Officer or Chairperson. Potentially, an individual could serve in the same position for 10 years. This amendment was proposed out of necessity, as very few individuals have been volunteering. We welcome new additions to the Board; in fact we have several positions that are currently vacant. If there is a vacant position that you are interested in or an occupied position that you think you would be like to do in the future, please contact any Board member and start volunteering now.
- 2. Article VI, Section 6 Duties The spending limit was amended to increase the dollar amount that requires approval of Active Membership. Previously, the amount requiring approval of active membership was \$1,500. The approved amendment changes the approval for amounts between \$1500 and \$3500 to 75% of the Executive Board (President, VP, Treasurer, and Secretary). Amounts over \$3500 will require approval of Active Membership. This amendment was proposed so that the Board could operate more efficiently.

The Treasurer's Report

The year-end detailed Treasurer's Report was handed out. CINA ended the year with \$8,742 in the bank and \$1,390 of CINA merchandise inventory on hand. (*Support you neighborhood and purchase a Tumbler or Tote at causewayisles.com.*) CINA's major items of revenues and expenses in 2019 were:

After CINA business, we heard from many City and community officials including Mayor Rick Kriseman, Police Chief Anthony Holloway, and our new district 1 Councilman, Robert Blackmon. Our neighborhood resource officer, Sgt. Gabe Lopez, was also on hand to answer questions about crime and policing in Causeway Isles. Additionally, representatives from the city's Neighborhood Affairs, Codes Compliance, and Sanitation divisions and a CONA representative were introduced and available to hear comments and answer questions.



Mayor Rick Kriseman spoke about the Pier, West Central District and the Causeway/ Central Avenue roadway. He also answered questions about the City's programs for the homeless.



St. Petersburg Police Chief Anthony Holloway, spoke about crime in the City and provided crime prevention tips. Main take away: Criminals are opportunistic so lock your cars and don't leave your windows open or door unlocked if not at home.



City Councilman for District 1, Robert Blackmon, introduced himself as our new District 1 Councilman (Former Councilman, Charlie Gerdes, reached his two term limit.) Councilman Blackmon even bought a CINA Tumbler, which he is showing off in this photo. (See Blackmon's introductory article.)


Beautification and Transportation Updates

Landscaping

At the end of 2019, Beautification Chairperson, Ed Gessen, obtained a \$500 neighborhood grant from the City of St. Petersburg to be used for landscaping in the medians on Central Avenue at 79th Street. Although the roadway belongs to the City of Treasure Island, the City of St. Petersburg approved CINA's request as this area impacts Causeway Isles residents. In January of this year, the \$500 mini grant, along with \$268 from CINA, was used to purchase 30 three gallon containers of crotons, 87 one gallon containers of jasmine, and irrigation supplies. The City of Treasure Island installed the irrigation system and All Seasons planted the shrubs and ground cover in the Central Avenue medians immediately before and after the traffic light.

Traffic Calming – 79th Street at 2nd and 4th Avenues

The City of St. Petersburg advertised for bids on construction of the mini traffic circles in February. If positive bids were received, construction of the temporary facilities could start as early as April. There will be approximately a 30-day period for motorists to get accustomed to the feature before final construction begins.

Sewer Lining Project

Capital Improvements in Causeway Isles

By now, everyone has noticed trucks, heavy equipemnt, dug up yards, neon painted numbers in front of houses and traffic being directed around workers on 79th Street. You may have wondered, "What's going on?"

As was mentioned in the previous edition of Isles Styles, the City of St. Petersburg is currently in the Construction Phase of a lateral cured in place pipe (CIPP) lining project in Causeway Isles. What exaactly does that mean?

CIPP lining is essentially constructing a new pipe (usually made of resin impregnated felt) within an old deteriorated pipe to stop leaks (infiltration of ground water into the pipe) and/or correct structural deficiencies (cracks, broken pipe, holes, etc.) This work is performed using specific labor crews, large trucks , and other ancillary equipment needed to invert the new pipe into place (think of turning a tube sock inside out) and cure it (harden the new pipe by ambient air, or heating with hot water or steam). It also involves above ground pumps and piping or hoses to divert sewage flow while the CIPP lining process is completed. Additional equipment for maintenance of traffic (MOT) is also deployed to ensure protection of the work area and the safe flow of traffic. The reason for the CIPP work is to reduce infiltration and to restore the structural integrity of the City's sewers. Causeway lsles was identified during studies conducted by the City, and subsequent analysis prioritized the neighborhood for needed mitigation of infiltration and inflow (I/I) and capacity improvements. It is estimated that around 60% of all infiltration into the City's sewers likely comes from laterals (the segments that connect to the homeowners privately owned portion of the sewer at the right of way line) with a large portion attributed to the private side. Infiltration contributes to the structural deterioration of piping, takes up capacity in sewers that is needed to prevent sanitary sewer overflows during peak flow events, and cost the City extra money for transporting and treating higher flows. It is normally more cost effective to CIPP line pipes that need rehabilitation, when it is still feasible, than it is to replace them with costly and highly disruptive excavation when they fail.

The construction phase is a multi-step process that involves different construction contractors, work crews and work types over different noncontinous time periods. (You may havehave noticed a decrease in the presence of the construction crews during December and Janauary.) Lateral lining occurs only after the City sewer mains have been lined.

<u>Step-1</u>: generally involves CCTV (closed circuit television) inspection, sometimes pre-cleaning where necessary, of the City's sewer main and publicly owned portion of sewer laterals for the segments that are planned to be CIPP lined. Step-1 is performed by crews using vans/trucks, televising equipment, and other cleaning trucks and equipment designed to collect the data for the City to determine if lining is possible, and if not, what other rehabilitation work is required. There is no disruption to flow, service, or excavation during Step-1.

Step-2: Where CIPP lining is deemed feasible, clean-outs are constructed adjacent to the property line to enable CIPP lateral lining to be performed. Clean-outs are City owned access structures necessary for this type of lateral lining. They provide an inspection and cleaning port for this work and any future maintenance work at the point of connection where the City has ownership of the sewer lateral. This work is disruptive and involves excavation, but is minimal compared to the excavation and cost that would be necessary to replace the entire publicly owned portion of the sewer lateral. In some cases, lining is not possible, and replacement of the entire lateral or more extensive repair is needed. Defects that often occur at or near the transition between the public /private sewer are corrected during this step. If crews encounter defective pipe on the private (customer) side, customers are typically notified directly and encouraged to have a plumber inspect and correct private-side-defects. Construction crews are required to notify residents of impending work in the adjacent right of way that would cause a disruption seven days in advance. Usually one notice is issued to cover periods of discontinuous work related to the same project.

<u>Step-3</u>: Final cleaning/CCTV, CIPP lateral lining, and post CCTV inspection is performed by specific crews configured to perform this work. This work involves short disruption in service to the homeowner, but no excavation. Multiple trucks, labor, and ancillary equipment is involved, as well as MOT and access to City owned structures in the right of way including manholes and clean-outs. When lining is complete, a post CCTV inspection confirms the acceptability of all work.



The CIPP lining of all publicly owned sewer laterals in Causeway Isles is expected to 12-14 months. Different areas are in different phases of construction. Some areas are entirely completed while others are just entering the phase described above under Step-1. (See color coded map for the current status of the project on each street in Causeway Isles)

Please keep in mind that CIPP lateral lining is usually the last final step the City takes to completely rehabilitate a gravity sewer pipe (the main and all connected laterals). Before CIPP lateral lining is performed, a considerable amount of time, work, and money is invested in the rehabilitation of the sewer mains (8" and larger pipe that the individual service laterals connect into) and access structures (manholes) in Causeway Isles. In doing that work, oftentimes excavation is required to correct certain defects where CIPP lining is not feasible. In order to be both operationally effective and cost effective, a sewer main must be CIPP lined before any lateral CIPP lining can take place (sewer main CIPP lining work is performed using different equipment and crews to complete based on current technologies, so it is discontinuous from the sewer lateral CIPP lining process described in #1 above).

CINA Councilman Robert Blackmon



Dear Causeway Isles residents,

Thank you so much for allowing me to speak at your recent meeting. For those of you I have not yet met, my name is Robert Blackmon and I am the new City Council member for District 1. A little bit about myself-I was born and raised in St. Petersburg. My family has a lot of deep ties to the area, with my grandfather having built a number of the mixed used buildings just over the bridge on Central Avenue back in the 1950s, including where I get my hair cut. My grandmother was a teacher at Euclid Elementary and then Boca Ciega High, where she retired as a guidance counselor in (I believe) 1983. Both my parents attended Northeast High where they were high school sweethearts, and I graduated from St. Pete High and Florida State University. My career, during and after college, has been commercial real estate, with a focus on multi family properties. For hobbies, I am an avid supporter of our local museums, love dining out at our great restaurants, and I really really love to kayak in the waters of Boca Ciega and Tampa Bay. I also love cigars.

My career has afforded me the experience of "tough love" when it comes to being fiscally smart and frugal. One of my biggest joys so far of this job has been the examination of the budget, bid by bid, line item by line item, trying to find savings wherever I can and analyze expenses.

To that end, I have a few initiatives I am working on. We have a discussion on potential "linkage fees" on February 27th. They would be an added fee applied per square foot on new construction in our city. I am bringing forth my own affordable housing proposal, which involves using money we already have on hand that the state is mandating we get rid of. By the time this news letter comes out, there should be movement one way or another.

Another plan I am working towards is fast tracking the renovation/ restoration of the various neighborhood signs in our district. Merna Park, Westgate Manor, Sheryl Manor, Sunhaven, and Robin Hill are all examples of fine mid-century architecture and design that has gone neglected. As we have seen a huge rise in interest in public arts and murals in the downtown core, I think it is the city's duty to treat all areas of our city equitably. If that involves applying gentle pressure and reminding everyone of the power- and value- of neighborhood pride, I am happy to be the conduit. These unique signs can also go from eyesore to eye catching displays of public art along 22nd and 38th Avenue.

As I mentioned in our budget priorities meeting, I also want to find a permanent home for Fire Station Number 2, ASAP. The station current operates out of a converted single family home at 3100 66th Street N. In this year's budget, I will make sure we find the funds to get our firefighters the permanent facility they need to ensure our public safety.

Regarding some feedback I received about Central Avenue's business corridor during the neighborhood association meeting: I love our area of town for its "old Florida" character, and that stretch is a great commercial hub. But it certainly could use some revitalization. We also need to get the stakeholders and businesses more involved with our various city committees and planners. As I have said before, the westward expansion of Central Avenue has been great for the city. But it hits a bump in the road around the old Central Plaza. My thinking, from an urban planning perspective, is that we need to independently start a revitalization of the most western part of Central, moving east to then meet in the middle. There is a lack of cohesiveness between the quality of shopping and retail in one direction on the beach side, and the other direction on Central Avenue. We need to close that gap. The West Central corridor is due for median and sidewalk enhancements, and one of my priorities for this year is to see sidewalk repair and cleaning- such as pressure washing and beautification- brought to the forefront.

I also mentioned in my budget priorities the need for constant infrastructure improvements, and I specifically said "not just the sewer and storm water systems", but also our bridges, roads and sidewalks. We need to make sure the city lives up to its end of the bargain when it comes to infrastructure and right of way and median beautification, and that the stakeholders (your neighborhood) are consulted and listened to every step of the way. You pay a lot of money in taxes, water bills and storm water fees to live here. And you have every right to make demands upon government and hold us accountable when it comes to prudent usage of your money.

I am looking eagerly towards the future on projects such as the Northwest water treatment plant expansion, and what is to be done with the rest of the former Science Center site. I am still new on the job, but I truly do hope to work with each and every one of you to make your neighborhood, our district, and our city (my hometown) a better, more beautiful place. Thank you.

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CINA BOAT CLUB

Captain's Corner - Capt. Bruce Erbeck

When people learn that I was in the US Navy, and am a licensed Captain, there are almost always questions on water and boating topics. Here are a few tips for proper passing techniques specifically related to passing or overtaking another vessel.

There can be some confusion with:

- Do I pass on port side or starboard side
- What if the boat in the front doesn't realize I'm passing
- How do I get their attention
- What about the wake created
- Passing a sail boat vs. power boat

Below are written guidelines as well as an image to help better illustrate the concept and procedure.

When passing another boat, sound a short horn blast to signal your presence and then give a wide clearance and pass the boat on the right (starboard) if possible. If navigation won't allow passing on the right, then again sound the horn with two short bursts and pass with a wide margin on the left (port). Use caution as boats coming head on may be masked by the forward boat. Don't put yourself in a situation of passing and having to yield to oncoming vessels.

These rules apply to two boats of power meeting each other on the water. The rules differ for other boats not under power like sailboats. The boat under power must yield to the boat without power and make maneuvers to avoid the boat without power. You can use the same horn blow sequence but offer the boat with the sail a wide birth and even consider coming off plane to reduce the amount of wake they will have to deal with when passing. (See graphic next page.)

Horn Blows

- Turn Starboard (Right) Short blast
- Turn Port (Left) Two short blasts
- Going Astern (backing up) Three short blasts
- Danger (to warn other boats of hazard ahead) Five short blasts
- Backing up from Dock One long blast

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





City of St. Petersburg Codes Compliance

PARKING COMMERCIAL EQUIPMENT



Commercial equipment includes any vehicle and/or equipment which is designed for a commercial or industrial function or contains exterior commercial advertising.

Commercial equipment is generally large, noisy and often painted to provide an advertisement for the business, which can adversely affect the appeal and livability of residential areas.

Restrictions on commercial vehicle parking have been a part of the City Code since 1973 when the increasing numbers of businesses were operated with mobile facilities, such as tow trucks, service and delivery trucks and vans.

In some cases, these businesses expected the employees to take the equipment home after work hours. The results were increased truck traffic in residential areas and less attractive neighborhoods.

Commercial equipment cannot be parked in residential districts unless it is stored within a completely enclosed building, such as a garage, which meets the district zoning requirements.

For additional information, please consult the City Code or your area Codes Investigator.

For each dwelling unit on a residential lot one commercial vehicle may be parked in a legal parking area provided it is designed as a limousine, van, pickup truck, SUV, or similar vehicle:

- Is no more than 22 feet in length and no more than 9 feet in height;
- Does not display commercial advertising or lettering in excess of 50% of the visible surface;
- Is in sound condition and properly licensed.

In addition to the above exception, one piece of commercial equipment from each of the following two categories is allowed:

- A properly licensed emergency or government service passenger vehicle designed as a van, pickup truck, SUV, car, or motorcycle such as law enforcement, fire, or municipal fleet vehicles;
- Motorized riding lawn mower provided it is used for single household residential purposes and provided it parked/ stored in accordance with codes governing domestic equipment.

All other commercial equipment parked in a residential district must be within a fully enclosed and lawfully permitted structure.
